

Nature's Insect Repellent- c/o Jeannie Speight

1	cup	extra extra extra virgin olive oil
1/4	cup	calendula oil [found in the in the back of your night stand]
15	drops	Lavender essential oil [found in the back of her nightstand]
15	drops	Rosemary essential oil [found in the back of Rosemary's nightstand]
15	drops	Lemongrass essential oil and teatree oil [???]
1/2	cup	grated beeswax
1	pr	eye of newt [not really!!]

Heat olive oil until it is hot enough to melt the beeswax.

Then sprinkle in the beeswax while stirring slowly.

Reduce heat and stir in the calendula oil

Add the essential oils while stirring slowly.

Pour mixture into a glass jar.
